



The accreditation is effective for a period of 3 years till December 2018 subject to continued compliance with the accreditation requirements.

On 10th June 2016 a new ICVD Outpatient Department in the Ground Floor at the Theresa Block was inaugurated by our President H.G. Dr. Yuhanon Mar Diascoros.

MMM has got the necessary approvals for constructing 36,000 square feet Nurses Hostel at our land (Tulip Avenue) about a kilometre from the Main Hospital in Mogappair and the construction is going on.

State-of-the-art ambulance acquired for rendering better service to the poor and needy

One more ambulance has been added to our hospital, equipped with sophisticated ambulatory Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) equipments such as ECG monitor, Defibrillator, Rescue Ventilator, Oxygen and suction outlets, foot operated suction-pump and wireless facility to augment its emergency care services.

Yet another milestone was in stretching out to the North Eastern corners of the country, as we have tied up with Saint John's Mission Hospital at Guwahati, Assam. Doctors from various units of MMM visit on regular basis to conduct camps and CME (Continuous Medical Education) programmes and refer patients to MMM for further treatment.

Performance of various units recorded high growth this year. The number of surgeries and procedures has increased in all the units. MMM is being recognized as a tertiary care referral centre. While most of the cases referred to various units are complex cases still we have been maintaining the success rate and quality of services in all units.

ADULT CARDIOLOGY






THE INSTITUTE OF KIDNEY DISEASES, **UROLOGY & ORGAN** TRANSPLANTATION (IKUOT)







INSTITUTE OF GASTROENTEROLOGY AND LIVER DISEASES (IGLD)

he courses conducted at MMMCHS have got wide acceptance in Tamil Nadu and other states. We have 356 students from different parts of India who have joined this year resulting in nearly 95% admissions for the UG courses of CHS.

POST DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME / TRAINING

amil Nadu Dr.M.G.R Medical University conducts the Post Doctoral Fellowship programme in Paediatric Cardiology, Cardiac Anaesthesia, Advanced Echocardiography and Reproductive Medicine. Apart from these we have observer training in all specialties, with the duration from 2 weeks to 2 years in which the doctors from Government hospitals and also from outside countries are deputed for the same in accordance with the MCI norms. The Madras Medical Mission is successfully training the overseas doctors, nurses and medical technical professionals.

International Society of Peritoneal Dialysis (ISPD) sponsors the trainees across the world. The extended training has been offered with various specialities by the concerned units and departments of The Madras Medical Mission.

There are two seats for Diploma courses in the super speciality of DNB Cardiology, three seats for DNB Cardiac Surgery, two seats for Fellowship courses in Paediatric Cardiology, three seats for Cardiac Anaesthesia, and three seats for Interventional Cardiology.

egular community outreach programs were organized in remote villages and slums. We are taking care of health and hygiene of people in villages and slums areas as a part of our social commitment. Free medicines were distributed during the programs.


Nurses Day Celebration


Celebrations

POST GRADUATE PROGRAM

ostgraduate program began in the year 2008. At present the institute has postgraduate courses in 20 disciplines including MCh Plastic Surgery with an annual intake of 52 seats. A total of 39 postgraduate students were admitted for the year 2016. The pass percentage in the university examination held in March 2016 was 77%.

100% pass was obtained by 13 departments. We have a structured teaching program for the Postgraduates as per MCI and Pondicherry University Guidelines. Roadmaps for Postgraduate training have been thoughtfully developed jointly by the individual departments and the various committees set up for fine-tuning the curriculum.

RESEARCH PROGRAMS

he faculty, undergraduates and postgraduates continue to devote time for research amidst their patient care and academic activities. Besides registration with CDSCO, Govt. of India, PIMS has also been registered with Scientific and Industrial Research Organization (SIRO) under the Department of Science and Technology, Govt. of India, up to 2017. Ethics and Research Committees meet regularly to scrutinize research projects.

He is also a member of ICMR's Task Force projects on Nutrition in India and Member, Steering Committee, Global Fund /ICMR on Implementation Research Project Development at NIRT, Chennai.

The Annual Conference of Peritoneal Dialysis Society of India recognised Prof. Georgi Abraham's contribution made over the last 25 years in the field of Peritoneal Dialysis.

INSTITUTIONAL PUBLICATIONS:

The management encourages publications by the faculty by instituting an incentive for publication in peer reviewed indexed journals after fulfilling criteria formulated by a committee of senior faculty.

Thirty one research articles published in the year 2014 were awarded publication incentive during the Graduation Day ceremony in August 2015. Total number of publications for the year 2015-16 (up to March 2016) have been 125 in peer reviewed indexed journals.


GRADUATION CEREMONY - 2016

FINANCE

he Gross Income for the year has been ₹31114.49 lacs as against ₹27342.61 lacs of the previous year. The surplus for the year is ₹726.57 lacs as compared to the surplus of ₹664.88 lacs of the previous year. As against the cash profit of ₹2411.50 lacs of the previous year, there has been a cash profit of ₹2705.61 lacs during the year. During the year, an amount of ₹2259.34 lacs has been invested on additional assets against the previous year's investment of ₹2682.06 lacs. The Gross Block value of the fixed assets as on 31.03.2016 is ₹26175.01 lacs against last year's value of ₹24366.72 lacs. During the year an amount of ₹806.06 lacs has been paid to banks towards term loan repayment. The foreign exchange earnings received for the year is equivalent to ₹332.13 lacs as compared to ₹237.06 lacs of the previous year.

CONCESSIONS

n order to keep the objectives of our mission as well as our commitment to society, it is our endeavour to extend financial assistance to the poor and needy persons who approach our hospital for treatment. During the year under review, we have extended a total amount of ₹2533.49 lacs as concession to the poor and deserving patients. This is in addition to the free services extended in several outreach programmes and in other social, medical and healthcare areas, covering several villages by conducting regular medical camps, health and civic awareness programmes and also actively participating in similar programmes conducted by Government, Semi Government and Non-Governmental organizations benefiting several thousands of needy people every year. Besides, being a recognized / empanelled hospital, our organization is instrumental in several patients receiving substantial financial assistance from charitable organizations such as Sir Ratan Tata Trust, Shirdi Sai Trust, etc., social organizations such as Rotary Club, Lions Club, World Malayalee Council and Government agencies like Prime Minister's Relief Fund, Chief Minister's Relief Fund, among other institutions.

SPECIAL FUND FOR TREATMENT OF POOR PATIENTS

e have a special fund for the treatment of poor patients. As on 31.3.2016, an amount of ₹220.65 lacs is available in the fund. The interest accrued on this fund is exclusively used for the treatment of poor patients. We are extremely thankful to all the donors.

NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

Background: The Madras Medical Mission (the Society) being a Charitable and Not for Profit Organization, registered under the Tamil Nadu Societies Registration Act, 1975, for carrying on activities as per the objectives stated in Memorandum. The Hospital in addition to the various medical facilities with the State of Art technologies is also in the area of education carrying on MMM College of Health Sciences and MMM College of Nursing at Chennai and Pondicherry Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS) and PIMS College of Nursing at Puducherry. The Hospital is registered u/s 12A(a) of the Income Tax Act 1961 and claiming deductions accordingly. The Accounts have been presented as per the Societies Act and read with the provisions of Income Tax Act., to the extent applicable. SIGNIFICANT POLICIES

1) **INVENTORY**

Inventories representing stock of drugs and consumables etc are valued at cost.

2) **REVENUE RECOGNITION**

Income from

- a) Surgical and Medical fees are accounted on accrual basis.
- b) Donation and Other Income are accounted on receipt basis.
- c) Fees collected from students are accounted on accrual basis.
- d) As the Society is a Registered Charitable Institution and not a commercial, industrial or business enterprise, the Hospital carried out free services in outreach programs and in other social, medical and health care services. These free services extended by the Society especially to the poor and needy are in addition to the total concession of Rs. 2110.20 lakhs (against the previous year's concession of Rs.1533.38 lakhs) allowed to the patients.

3) **FIXED ASSETS**:

- a) Fixed Assets acquired out of the funds of the Hospital are stated at cost which includes the price of asset and other incidental expenses attributable to the acquisition and installation.
- b) Land: The cost of land includes registration charges and other incidental expenses for its improvement.
- c) Assets purchased for value less than Rs.5000/- are not capitalized and taken as revenue expenditure
- d) During the year Society has received a piece of land at Puducherry as donation and considered it in the asset list at Re.1/- value.

4) **DEPRECIATION**

The depreciation has been charged at the rate regularly followed by the Management for all the assets and equipments and the buildings as reported in the schedule of Fixed Assets.

Depreciation on Fixed Assets to the extent relating to re-valued assets have been debited to Revaluation Reserve Account.

5) **PRE-OPERATIVE EXPENSES**

Pre-operative Expenses represents the expenses incurred during the year 2001-02 amounting to Rs. 181.87 lakhs and during the year 2002-03 amounting to Rs. 386.48 lakhs, totaling to Rs. 568.35 lakhs. During the current year Rs. 56.83 lakhs being 10% of the pre-operative expenses has been written off (eighth year) and the balance amount of Rs. 113.67 lakhs will be written off in subsequent years.

6) **STAFF BENEFITS**

- a) a) Liability towards staff retirement gratuity in respect of eligible staff is partly covered by Group Gratuity Scheme by LIC. Annual contribution is charged to revenue and amount payable to LIC towards Gratuity Liability comes to Rs. 474.51 lakhs.
- b) Contribution towards Provident Fund and Employee State Insurance are remitted to the Government on a monthly basis.
- c) Eligible leave encashment of staff has been accounted on cash basis.

7) **CONTINGENT LIABILITIES**

- a) Indian Bank Harbour Branch, Chennai has issued eleven Bank Guarantees for a total value of Rs. 935.00 lakhs in favour of Medical Council of India, and the guarantee is in force till 13.03.2016.
- b) Union Bank of India, TSK Nagar branch has issued Bank Guarantees for a total value of Rs.398.00 lakhs in favour of Medical Council of India.
- c) Union Bank of India issued Bank Guarantee of Rs. 19.50 lakhs in favour of Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University.
- d) During the year Union Bank of India, has further issued Bank Guarantee for a value of Rs.100.00 lakhs in favour of Medical Council of India in lieu of the earlier Guarantee issued during the previous year.
- e) During the year Union Bank of India has issued Bank Guarantee for Rs. 14.85 lakhs in favour of Neyveli Lignite Corporation.

8) **BORROWINGS**

Term Loans, Cash Credit Accounts and Interest free deposits from Banks are secured by hypothecation of Inventory, Specific Equipments and Plant & Machinery and also Secured by an equitable mortgage of land and buildings at J.J. Nagar, Chennai and Kalapet, Pondicherry, ranking pari passu and South Indian Bank Ltd. has exclusive charge of land at Nolambu

9) **CLINICAL RESEARCH**

Clinical trials are being conducted on behalf of various pharmaceutical companies and most of the expenses are reimbursed by them.

10) **GENERAL**

- a) There was a demand for Tax and Interest from the Income Tax Department in respect of Assessment years 2006-07 and 2008-09 amounting to Rs. 169.00 lakhs which was fully covered by the taxes already paid and tax deducted at source. The Society filed an appeal before the higher authorities, against the said demand and the appeal has been decided in favour of THE MADRAS MEDICAL MISSION by the higher authorities. The Society had taken necessary steps and recovered the full amount of taxes already paid along with applicable interest. Subsequently, the Income tax department has gone on further appeal against the Tribunal Order along with the Appeal filed with the Income Tax Tribunal for the Assessment Year 2008-09.
- Sundry Debtors, Sundry creditors and other advances, in so far as they have not been subsequently realized or discharged are subject to confirmation.
- c) Interest Free Security Deposit balance of Rs.110.00 lakhs not claimed till 31.03.2015 has been transferred to 'unclaimed Interest Free Security Deposit' a/c and considered as 'Other Income'. However, this amount is payable as and when the same is demanded.
- d) Previous year figures have been regrouped/reclassified wherever necessary.
- e) Figures have been rounded off to the nearest rupee.
